

Graduation Rate During the COVID-19 pandemic, the number of graduates nearly matched last year's all-time high number.

Portland Opportunities Industrialization Center + **Rosemary Anderson High School**

is committed to the success of youth at hope through the age of 25, providing the highest quality services in education, mentoring, family outreach, employment training and placement.

Established in 1968 in North Portland, POIC + RAHS currently serves more than 2000 students, work trainees, and families annually (80% are Black or Latinx.)

Our major programs include Rosemary Anderson Schools, Work Opportunities Training, Community Healing Initiative, Youth Services, and Community Safety.

At POIC + RAHS, we reconnect alienated at-risk youth affected by poverty, family instability, and homelessness to education, career training, and culturally specific wraparound programs, including services for families impacted by the criminal justice system.

COVID-19 Success Story

LaTasha, a single mom of 5, dreamed of owning a home and raising a successful family. She was putting in the hard work to achieve the dream – taking on two jobs, at OHSU and Safeway. She received grants to help pay for a down payment and even found a home in North Portland she liked. Then COVID hit, and LaTasha got sick. She was one of the first confirmed cases of COVID in Oregon.

Never hospitalized because of the virus, LaTasha recovered, thankfully. In May, she was able to complete the home purchase.
